



Stand With Tolbert!

Caroline County's Tolbert Rowe is now a media sensation.

At least, when it comes to going viral over the many sports internet sites.

The reason? The media's coverage – and fans' reaction – to Rowe's turning his back on New York Yankees' slugger Alex Rodriguez each time he batted during the Yankees' April 13 game against the Baltimore Orioles.

Rowe, a partial plan season ticket holder for many years, concocted his scheme on the way to the game and each time the Yankees slugger, who sat out the 2014 season after being caught taking performance enhancing drugs (PED), came to bat, Rowe stood up from his left-field seat and turned his back.

Turning one's back on a person is considered a sign of disrespect.

Rodriguez, one of the greatest sluggers of all-time, is back in the lineup for the 2015 season and is in pursuit of Barry Bonds' all-time home run record. Entering the April 13 game, Rodriguez had 655 home runs – five behind beloved Hall of Famer Willie Mays. By the end of the week, he had hit three home runs for 65 career homers and seemed a lock to pass Mays into fourth-place all-time.

Despite his suspension, Rodriguez has denied taking PEDs – and has taken a stance on the subject that has made himself look like the victim.

Rowe said that is why he reacted to Rodriguez as he did, when he didn't act that way towards two Orioles who were also suspended for using PEDs – Nelson Cruz and Chris Davis.

"I don't respect him," said Rowe. "He doesn't deserve to be watched. Absolutely not, I'm sorry. You know, and now they got all this about his tying Willie Mays's record and the \$6 million, and he has the audacity to think that he should be paid. I'm sorry. I don't respect the guy. Not one bit."

"He's the epitome of all that was wrong about (baseball). And he's been so successful. Maybe it's jealousy, maybe it isn't," said Rowe. "But I just don't think that he deserves to be in the class with other players that have never have taken (PEDs). And I mean, he lied about it. I'm sorry. He doesn't deserve my respect."

"The others, they accepted their guilt, owned up to it, and served their suspensions without trying to blame someone else or deny that they had done it. (Rodriguez) has never done that."



Rowe's actions caught the eye of Washington Post reporter Adam Kilgore, who came down to talk to Rowe in the seventh inning and ultimately wrote the first story about Rowe's stance.

"I couldn't believe it, all of a sudden here is this guy suddenly sitting next to me asking me for an interview," said Rowe. "It wasn't my intention for it to be noticed like that. I just had meant to show my lack of respect in my own way."

After Kilgore's story hit the electronic media along with a picture of Rowe facing away from the field, the story went viral. Suddenly, Rowe became a "media darling," so to speak. The story was picked up by almost every media source imaginable, including ESPN, Sporting News and several New York newspapers.

"There was lots of reaction to what I did," said Rowe. "Most of the media coverage was positive ... and the fans around and behind me were supportive. Especially as the game went one and (Rodriguez) got out every time he came to bat."

Rowe said he has received a healthy share of negative publicity as well for his stand. He said most of them came from New York fans reacting to the stories in the New York newspapers.

"If you go down to where the readers react (to the story), you will see where there were a lot of Yankees fans who had negative things to say about it," he said. "There were some really hurtful things said about me, what I did, and what should happen to me. I have been called every name in the book."

Despite what was written by some New York papers, Rowe said reports that fans in the area around him complained that they could not see were "absolutely untrue."

"Nobody asked me to sit down or complained to me about not being able to see. If they had, I would have sat down," he said. "But nobody did."

Tim Anderson, a fan at the game who documented Rowe's actions on Twitter and took a picture of him with his back to the field, told the New York Daily News that the fans in Rowe's section supported what he did, even if they didn't join in.

"When he stood up and turned around for the first at-bat, he urged others to do the same. No one really listened to him," Anderson told the Daily News. "They all just laughed at him or took pictures of him like I did. I honestly thought he would do it for the first pitch or so and then sit down and watch — I really thought he was joking.

"But when he stood for the entire at-bat and then did it again for the three at-bats after that, I realized that he truly wanted to make a point. And, as far as I could tell, everyone respected the stand he was taking. No one behind him complained that they couldn't see the field, no Yankee fan harassed him. He was almost just a part of the game whenever A-Rod (Rodriguez) came to the plate."

Rowe remains amazed at the reaction.

"I never dreamed there would be that kind of reaction to it," said Rowe. "If I learned anything it's the power of the internet and how something can go viral in no time at all," Rowe said.

Rowe said many of the fans, and friends,

reacting to his actions have urged him to produce t-shirts promoting his stand towards Rodriguez. He said he's considering doing so, but that he would donate whatever profit came from the shirt to the Caroline Challengers sports program for special needs kids and adults.

"If I had t-shirts made, and I am looking into it, I would never dream of profiting from them personally. I would price them low enough so people could afford to buy them and I would donate whatever profits were made to the Challengers program," said Rowe.

Rowe, who has a special-needs daughter, has been a supporter of the Chal-

lengers program for many years.

"If you have ever seen them play, you see what competition is all about. They are very passionate about playing, but do it for the enjoyment of the game," he said. "To me, the way they embrace athletics for the fun of it, epitomizes what baseball should be all about."

Rowe said that he would have the t-shirts made by the Benedictine School print shop and would hope that at least \$5 from every shirt sold would go to the Challengers program.

"That way, both programs would ben-

efit," he said. "I wouldn't do it to make money myself."

When interviewed, Rowe said he wasn't sure what the shirt's logo would look like.

"It would say something like 'I stand with Tolbert ... and for baseball' on one side and maybe have a silhouette of the picture that was taken of me on the other side," he said.

Rowe, who said he had already had more than 100 people call him to say they wanted a shirt, promised he would make the shirt affordably-priced.

"No more than \$15 per shirt," added Rowe.

Rowe is president of the county's Board of Education and a well-known mortgage banker in the area. He said he had also received many comments from his friends on what he did and all the hoopla it has caused.

"It has shocked me ... it's been unforgettable," he said. "It's been humbling to me.

"I never meant to get all the attention I did," he added. "I never imagined I would be interviewed by Adam Kilgore or would be interviewed on the radio about it. The number of people who have commented on it to me personally and on my Facebook account has been incredible.

"The reaction to it was like nothing I imagined," he said.

Looking forward, Rowe said he plans to repeat his actions towards Rodriguez whenever the Yankees play at Baltimore this season and he is in attendance at the game.

The Art and Science of Real Estate Appraisals

Determining the value of a piece of real estate is part art and part science. By analyzing sales that have occurred within a specific time frame an appraiser comes to a value conclusion using concrete concepts and protocols. These concepts and protocols are designed in such a way to balance out the differences in features between two different properties by assigning certain dollar values to differences in amenities and features between the house being appraised, also known as the Subject property, with homes that have sold within the last six to nine months, which are called Comparable Sales.

A comparable sale is a property that the appraiser has determined to be “most like” the subject property and it is this concept of “most like” where the art of appraising becomes evident.

The easiest way to describe the concept of “most like” is that a home’s appraised value will be based upon homes that have sold within a specific time frame, usually no longer than nine months from the date of the appraisal, that is “most like” the subject property. Since no two homes are exactly alike the job of the appraiser is to “artfully” select those

comparable sales that are most like the subject and make monetary adjustments for attributes or deficiencies the comparable sale has in relation to the subject property.

Now I know this sounds a little confusing so I think it would be easier to understand if we looked at two homes that are exactly alike. A good example of what I consider a really easy appraisal, where the homes are nearly exactly alike, and not much “art” is necessary are townhomes.

The job of valuing a piece of real estate is made much easier if all of the comparable sales come from the same townhouse development or subdivision where size, room count and amenities are usually the same among all similar units. Sure you can have some townhouse units that are three bedrooms and some that are two bedrooms, or some that have a garage on the first floor and some that have living space instead. But when several units have sold with the same basic characteristics the value of the subject property is much easier to determine.

If a three bedroom townhouse unit sold for \$125,000 three months ago then it is fairly safe to say that your three bedroom

townhouse unit with the same amenities should be valued the same. So it is not realistic to think that the house will sell for more than what other homes exactly like it are selling for. No one will pay more for a home than what it is worth, correct? Well, maybe not.

Basic economic theory says that an object’s value is determined based upon the price a willing buyer is willing to pay and what price a willing owner will sell for. Value is determined at the price point where there is a meeting of the minds of the buyer and the seller.

Let’s just say that you are buying this townhouse for \$150,000 because it is what the seller is asking for the property and it is absolutely perfect for you. The seller feels that they have just won the lottery because you have agreed to pay them \$25,000 more than an identical unit sold for three months ago. But there is another hurdle you have to jump and that is a loan to purchase the townhouse, so you make application with your favorite loan officer and sit back and wait for them to do their duty and approve your loan.

A major concern of your lender is whether or not the price you have agreed to pay for the property, \$150,000, is “justified” by sales of similar homes in the area at that time. So the lender orders an appraisal from an appraisal management company and assigns an appraiser to determine if the price you paid is justified based on the sale price of similar homes. Once this is done guess what value the appraiser comes up with? Correct, \$125,000.

Because another townhouse sold for \$125,000 three months ago that sale became the comparable sale that the subject properties appraised value would be, regardless of the fact that you agreed to pay \$150,000.

This scenario sets up three possible solutions; first the buyer can get out of the contract because the house did not appraise for what they were willing to pay. And who wants to pay \$25,000

more than what the appraiser said it was worth. Nobody wants to think they are starting out in the hole from an equity standpoint. Too many people found out the hard way when the real estate market collapsed starting in 2007-2008.

Second, the seller can agree to lower the price to \$125,000 because they really need to sell and move on with their life. This option means the seller expectations have not been met and they are convinced that they need to cut their losses and run. After all, the market could continue to deteriorate and the value could go down further.

Third, the buyer can agree to pay \$150,000 for a townhouse that is only worth \$125,000, by paying an additional \$25,000 down. Lenders will base what they will lend on the actual sale price of the property or the properties appraised value, whichever is least. So, if the buyer was originally putting \$15,000 down or 10% of the sale price of \$150,000 they would have to come up with the difference, an additional \$22,500 because the lender will lend 90% of the appraised value because the appraised value is lower. (90% of \$125,000 is \$112,500). The buyer would obviously have to have a really good reason to pay \$25,000 more than the house appraised for.

Or fourth, the buyer and seller can negotiate some amount in between.

For homes that are not alike in the same subdivision the job of determining a home's value becomes much more time consuming for the appraiser and con-

sequently more art than science. Their job, once they have inspected the subject property, is to then evaluate homes within a certain radius of the subject property, usually about 10 miles. Then they have the task of valuing amenity differences between the subject and comparable sale and keep the dollar amount of those differences as low as possible. This can be extremely difficult when the home is unique in one or several ways, such as a log home, or a dome house or home built on pilings.

Finding a home "most like" a home that is not in a subdivision where all the homes are alike, or very similar, is where the art of appraising is most evident. Because the appraiser has the task of selecting homes that have the most amenities like the subject property, AND those dollar amount differences, or adjustments do not exceed certain percentages, the comparable sales selected can

have a bearing on the subject properties final value.

And how the appraiser presents the comparable sale and makes adjustments within acceptable ranges is closely evaluated by the underwriter. In some cases, if the underwriter is not comfortable with the use of certain comparable sales they can, and they will, ask for additional comps. And if additional comps are not there then the loan can actually be declined for unacceptable collateral. Even when the borrower's credit and income is acceptable the property may not be.

To avoid problems with values you should use local lenders, who use local appraisers who are very familiar with the uniqueness of our area and the challenges of appraising in a market where most homes are not in tract subdivisions where homes are very much alike. You could save yourself a lot aggravation and money by doing so.





What is the Ambulance Subscription Plan?

The Ambulance Subscription Plan is an annual program offered by Caroline County Emergency Medical Services that ensures that in the event of an emergency, you won't have any out-of-pocket expenses associated with ambulance transportation from your home to the hospital. There is also a Business Plan that covers the expense of ambulance transportation for employees from their workplace to the hospital.

Why should I enroll?

Ambulance transportation to the hospital can exceed \$600. Even if you have excellent insurance, your provider often only covers a fraction of the cost. Enrollment ensures that as a resident of Caroline County, you will not have any out-of-pocket expenses associated with transportation from your home to the hospital. Your enrollment in the Ambulance Subscription Plan also gives back to the community - funds are used to support Caroline's emergency service providers.

How do I enroll?

An Ambulance Subscription Plan Enrollment Form was mailed to all Caroline County households in April. Simply complete the application and return with payment as instructed on the form. If you did not receive the form, please call 410-479-8140 to request an application.

Starting the second week of May, Caroline County residents and businesses will also be able to enroll in the plan online at CarolineDES.org.

Rabies Prevention and Vaccination

Did you know that every year it is estimated that 40,000 persons receive a rabies prevention treatment called post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) due to a potential exposure to rabies (<http://www.cdc.gov/features/dsrabies/>). Rabies is an acute, progressive viral infection that nearly always results in fatal encephalitis. An exposure to the rabies virus may occur when a person is bitten by or exposed to saliva of a rabid animal. It is extremely important to take the necessary steps to keep you and your family safe from any exposures to the rabies virus:

- Always keep your pets up-to-date on rabies vaccinations.
- Keep your pet(s) under your control at all times, especially when traveling.
- Enjoy wildlife from a distance. Do not feed wildlife.
- Avoid contact with sick animals and any animals that are acting in an unusual manner.
- Keep garbage cans covered securely. Do not leave pet food outside.
- Do not attempt to relocate wildlife.
- Prevent bats from entering your home.

Animals with rabies often show changes in behavior. Wild animals may act friendly, domestic animals may become aggressive, and animals that are active only at night may appear during the day. Rabid animals may stagger, drool, or become paralyzed. The diagnosis of rabies is made by examining brain tissue from the suspected rabid animal. Any suspected exposure to a rabid animal should be reported immediately to the Caroline County Health Department at 410-479-8045.

June 2nd at the Health & Public Services (HAPS) building (403 S. 7th St., Denton) 5 to 7 p.m.

Cats must be on a leash with the leash attached to the cage.

Dogs must be on a leash under the control of an adult. Vaccinations are \$5 per animal.

Please call 410-479-8045 starting May 1st to pre-register animals. Pre-registration is not required, but recommended if there will be multiple animals in attendance.

Prescription Opioid Abuse: A First Step to Heroin Use?

Prescription opioid pain medications such as Oxycontin and Vicodin can have effects similar to heroin when taken in doses or in ways other than prescribed, and they are currently among the most commonly abused drugs in the United States. Research now suggests that abuse of these drugs may open the door to heroin abuse.

Nearly half of young people who inject heroin surveyed in three recent studies reported abusing prescription opioids before starting to use heroin. Some individuals reported taking up heroin because it is cheaper and easier to obtain than prescription opioids.

Many of these young people also report that crushing prescription opioid pills to snort or inject the powder provided their initiation into these methods of

drug administration.

A BIT OF STATISTICS

According to the Drug and Alcohol-Related Intoxication Deaths in Maryland 2013 Report, published by Md. Department of Health and Mental Hygiene:

- The three leading substances that caused death among Marylanders were (1) Heroin, over 450 deaths (2) Prescription Opioids, slightly over 300 deaths, and (3) Alcohol, just above 250 deaths.
- A total of 858 drug and alcohol-related intoxicated deaths occurred in Maryland in 2013, a 7% increase compared to 2012.
- The largest increase in heroin deaths occurred in individuals 25-34.
- 27% of heroin-related deaths occurred in combination with alcohol.
- More than half of all alcohol-related deaths occurred in combination with heroin, and 26% in combination with prescription drugs.

May is Melanoma Awareness Month

We all welcome the warmth and sunshine that May brings. Gardens and farmland get planted, boats are being readied for summer crabbing and fishing, outside projects are underway, kids are playing ball and riding bikes until the sun goes down. Now and truly all year round is the time to build safe sun habits into your family's daily routine to prevent sun damage and potential skin cancer.

Skin Cancer is the most common type of cancer with more than 3.5 million new cases diagnosed in the USA every year. There are three main types of skin cancer. Most are either Basal cell or Squamous cell carcinoma. These seldom become life threatening. The third type, Melanoma is less common but a more serious cancer. It is responsible for more than 75% of skin cancer deaths. In Maryland, the highest melanoma rates are on the Eastern and Western shores of The Chesapeake Bay and Central Maryland counties.

When diagnosed early, melanoma can be cured! It is also the most preventable type of cancer. Everyone has some risk for developing skin cancer, some more than others. These include (1) light skin that burns or freckles easily, (2) naturally light hair, blonde, red or light brown, (3) light colored eyes, blue, green or grey, (4) family history of skin

cancer, and (5) a history of sunburns as a child. One or two blistering sunburns as a child doubles a person's chance of developing melanoma later in life. (6) Tanning bed use.

Dark-skinned people are more likely to get melanoma on palms of hands, soles of feet, nail beds and lips.

Recognize Melanoma

Know your ABCDE's! **A:** Asymmetry. One half of a mole doesn't look like the other. **B:** Border. Irregular edges to a mole, not defined. **C:** Color. Different colors appear in the same mole. **D:** Diameter. The mole is larger than the end of a pencil eraser. **E:** Elevated or Enlarged. Other warning signs may include a sore that doesn't heal, a spread of color from the border into neighboring skin, a change in sensation in a mole such as itchiness, tenderness or pain, oozing or bleeding from a mole, a brown or black spot underneath a nail.

Ways to protect you and your family.

- Avoid direct sun when it is strongest, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.
- Encourage your children to play in the shade.
- Wear protective clothing such as a wide-brimmed hat, long sleeve shirt and UV protection sunglasses.
- Use 15 SPF or higher UVA/UVB sunscreen. Keep an extra small bottle in your car, purse and kids backpack
- Avoid tanning beds.

Check your skin thoroughly once a month. Get to know your skin and your own pattern of moles, freckles and birthmarks. Have someone else check your back and scalp (places that may be hard for you to see). Call your doctor if you find any new or changing skin growths. Taking these steps will significantly reduce your chances of developing skin cancer and enjoying a happy, sunburn-free summer!

Immunization Information For Parents

Immunizations have helped children stay healthy for more than 50 years. They are safe and they work.

In fact, serious side effects are no more common than those from other types of medication. Your child needs all of the following shots to stay healthy:

Hepatitis A and B, Rotavirus, DTaP and Tdap, Hib, Pneumococcal, Polio, Influenza, MMR, Varicella, Meningococcal, HPV

In the United States vaccines protect children from many diseases. However, in many parts of the world vaccine-preventable diseases are still common. Because diseases may be brought into the United States by Americans who travel abroad or from people visiting areas with current disease outbreaks, it's

important that your child is vaccinated.

While breastfeeding gives some protection against many diseases (and is the best nutrition for your baby), it is not a substitute for immunizations. However, breastfeeding and immunizations work well together. Children should get most of their shots during the first two years of life. This is because many of the diseases are the most severe in the very young. Most newborns receive their first shot (Hepatitis B) at birth before

leaving the hospital and more are given at well-child checkups. Other shots are given before children go to school.

Older children and teens also need immunizations to continue to protect them throughout adolescence and early adulthood. There may be mild side effects like swelling, redness and tenderness where the shot was given, but they do not last long. Your child may also have a slight fever and be fussy for a short time afterward. It is rare for side effects to be serious. However, call your child's doctor right away if you have any concerns.

Children with certain health problems may need to avoid some vaccines or get them later. In most cases, children with cancer, those taking oral or injected steroids for lung or kidney conditions or those who have problems with their immune systems should not get vaccines that are made with live viruses. To protect these children, it is very important for others to be vaccinated. For children with a recent history of nerve disorders, the pertussis part of the DTaP vaccine may need to be delayed. However, a child with a minor illness such as low-grade fever, an ear infection, cough, a runny nose or mild diarrhea can safely be immunized.

Keep in mind, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration tests all vaccines and monitors where and how vaccines are made. The places where vaccines are made are licensed. They are regularly inspected and each vaccine lot is safety-tested before release. Remember, vaccines definitely prevent diseases and save lives. It's important to follow the schedule recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics. Contact your child's doctor or local health department if you have any questions.



Museum Exhibit Offers a Look Into the Relation of Sports History to Small Town

Since April 4, the Federalsburg Historical with the help of its members and friends, has transformed its museum in the old Williams-Covey garage into a mind-boggling display of local sports memorabilia that shouldn't be missed by anyone interested in county history or its sports accomplishments.

Woven around the Smithsonian Institute's retro exhibit "Hometown Sports, How Sports Shape America," the grassroots display steals the show from the more generic traveling collection.

The Smithsonian exhibit is designed in such a way as to promote and pay tribute to the role hometown sports play in smalltown America. The pre-fab display is loaned out on a short-term basis to only five communities in each state each year, so to be selected to display the Smithsonian exhibit is quite an honor. This year, with the support of the Maryland Humanities Council, Federalsburg

was selected as one of the five communities to host the exhibit.

"It was a real honor for our town to be selected to show the exhibit," said historical society member and project co-chair Wendy Garner. "We were told that the (humanities council) was looking to show the exhibit at locations that were having a positive effect on the neighborhood it served. This certainly was a feather in our cap."

Secure in the knowledge that the display was coming to town and that additional exhibit space was available in the museum to expand upon it, it was up to the Federalsburg Historical Society to do the rest.

And, wow, have they hit it out of the park with the effort its members collectively put forth to make the exhibit a celebration of local sports lore - not just in presenting memories of the community's standout sports stars and teams, but also in its presentation of the events that have come to define the community.

"We think we captured the essence of what hometown teams are all about," said Garner.

Right off the bat, those visiting the dis-

play are met by a realistic rendering of the town's Soapbox Derby course from the perspective of standing at the finish line at the bottom of the Central Avenue looking up the hill to the starting line. Original soapbox cars which actually ran in the race cross the finish line at the bottom of the painting.

The mural, the work of Colonel Richardson High School art teacher Marjorie Scott, is representative of the effort and contributions put forth by the community as a whole.

Also on display are other derby-winning cars, which literally hang from the rafters of the museum, as well as the long list of the event's winners. This year's qualifier will take place on June 6.

Danny Phillips, who coordinates the derby each year and who has had several derby winners from his family, said he was amazed at the display and that he felt it "did justice" to the role the race played in the town's culture.

Dickie Wheatley, Co-chair of the project, said the community overwhelmingly took pride in putting together the exhibit.

"It truly became a community project," said Wheatley. "We asked the community to bring us their keepsakes and memories and they responded in a way we could not have even imagined."

Two of the county's better-known sports heroes are Jimmy Escalante and Robert "Ducky" Detweiler. Both receive recognition with well-stocked displays of their actual uniforms - Escalante with the Delmarva Shorebirds and Detweiler by his Federalsburg A's minor league jersey. There is also a huge exhibit of memorabilia from Detweiler's 1942 and 1946 major league stints with the Boston Braves. Following his major league career, Detweiler returned to Federalsburg where he continued to play for the Federalsburg As. He wound up making Federalsburg his home and went on to become a noted umpire and coach in the region.

Escalante, who moved to Federalsburg from Los Angeles as a youth, played professional baseball for 13 years following his graduation from Colonel

Richardson and also coached for another seven years.

One of the county's most heralded female athletes, Kim Brooks, is also honored with a special display. Brooks, Colonel Richardson Class of 1978, still holds the state 1A long jump record. A state champion and AAU star, her promising career was cut short by an injury.

Another display honors the Colonel Richardson High School marching band, which won 12 state titles over 13 years from 1988 to 2001. Another exhibit honors the South Carolina Little League team which played in the national Little League World Series. Two of that team's players - Nik Nowotnick and Hunter Bennett - went on to play college baseball. Nowotnick, in fact, opened 2015 playing for the Delmarva Shorebirds.

In addition to the sports displays are exhibits promoting other hallmarks of the town - a display in tribute to the old button factories that made their home in Federalsburg, actual machines used to make the buttons are on display, and a "dollhouse" styled model of the Exeter House, a turn of the century mansion now undergoing restoration under the guidance of the historical society is also an interesting addition.

It is amazing, the professionalism shown by the members of the historical society and the volunteers that make up the museum staff. The "hometown" display ranks right up there in expertise to the actual Hometown Heroes display. The quantity of local memorabilia is amazing, taking up an entire room and filling all four walls of the smaller exhibit room as well.

It is an exhibit that will take more than just a quick look to fully experience and appreciate. It is obvious from the many exhibits put together by volunteers that a great amount of work, thought - and pride - went into the final product.

Joe Glime, whose wife Gloria is president of the historical society, said the Hometown Sports exhibit allowed the community to undertake as a group a project it might not otherwise have attempted. He said he sensed a strong "pride of ownership" from community

Caroline County Emergency Medical Services Ambulance Subscription Plan Enrollment

The last week of April, all households in Caroline County received enrollment packets for Caroline County Emergency Medical Services' Ambulance Subscription Plan. This program protects those enrolled from unexpected medical expenses by ensuring that in the event of an emergency, they will not be charged for ambulance transportation to the hospital.

The cost of emergency ambulance transportation can exceed \$600, and even with excellent insurance, providers often only cover a fraction of the cost. Enrollment in the Ambulance Subscription Plan guarantees that you will not be charged for emergency ambulance transportation by Caroline County providers to the hospital.

Rates for the plan start at \$45 for an individual or family of two, and the cost for a family of three or more is \$75. The business plan costs \$100 for up to 10 employees, \$150 for 11 – 25 employees, and \$200 for businesses with more than 25 employees.

Starting in mid May, Caroline County residents and businesses will also have the option of enrolling in the plan online through the Caroline County Department of Emergency Service's website – CarolineDES.org.

"We want to make it as easy as possible for our residents and businesses to take advantage of this fantastic program, and are excited to be able to offer online enrollment," says Bryan Ebling, Director of Caroline County's Department of Emergency Services.

Enrollment in the plan also gives back to the community. Funds are used to support Caroline's emergency service providers, including eight volunteer fire companies and the county paramedics.
